League Roundup



League play is continuing to be competitive in all most leagues at the club as they transition into second rounds. In Boston Pizza Team Entry, there are six of ten teams within four points of each other at the moment, some of them have played out their first round schedules and some still have games that remain unplayed. The Stephen Leslie rink sits atop the standings as of the last update with seven wins against no losses for 14 points and two games unplayed. They are followed closely by The Russell Fitzgerald rink with six wins and two loses for 12 points with one game remaining unplayed, that game being against the team they are chasing, the Leslie rink. The Gordie Cormier rink has one loss this season but with five wins and 10 points, they must make the most of three games remaining after already falling to league leader Team Leslie in the draw. Gary Landry's, Robert Agnew's and Brian Laughlin's rinks all have ten points as well. Laughlin having played out all of their games and Landry with one remaining have no chance of taking over first but Team Landry can play spoiler as they still have to play Team Leslie. Team Agnew has two games unplayed, one being against Cormier and an opportunity to spoil his bid at a comeback to take over first. This all only matters if the remaining league games will be played because, if not, the Leslie Foursome will be crowned regular season champs as Team Entry moves into a playoff round starting on Sunday, February 5th. Teams will be divided into two divisions of five each and play a round robin within that division as well as one crossover game with a team in the other division. Once the round robin finished teams will be seeded and play a single game elimination bracket with winners moving on and losers playing consolation until we have an overall playoff winner.

In the East Side Mario's Mixed league, round one of two finished up late in January but a winner is still to be decided. Due to team Thistle leaving the

league during round one, some teams has a bye in the round and some did not. The Gary Landry rink and the Bryant Cormier rink are in contention to win the round and it has been decided that they will play one deciding game to see who will take the overall title in round one. The date that this game will be played is yet to be determined. Meanwhile, round two has gotten underway in Mixed as of January 30th. Teams were shuffled and curlers moved around to form new teams to compete in the second round with another winner to be decided at the end.

In the Firestop Enterprises Men's League, round two of round robin play has also gotten underway but, in this league, teams do not change and points from both round one and two are accumulated to determine a regular season champ. The Russell Fitzgerald rink and the Gordie Cormier rink sit tied for first at this juncture, each boasting fourteen points with identical 7 and 2 records. Gary Landry sits close behind with twelve points. Keith MacEachern also sits within striking distance with five games remaining in the regular season.

The Schooner Doubles League has proven competitive again this season with no less than ten of the participants sporting ten or more points and all of those within four points or less of current leader Keith MacEachern. With over two months left in the schedule, there is ample opportunity for those as well as most other competitors to make a run at first place. Doubles has proven very popular once again, now enjoying its second year on the Schooner calendar. While play is limited to 24 players each week, the league actually has 26 and two competitors each week enjoy a bye. Partners rotate for each game so you get to play with different people each week.

All curling team skips are reminded that there is a free sheet of ice available every Monday and Tuesday night at 8pm. These sheets can be used for makeup games, exhibition games or practice. Please verify availability with the draw master, Richard Lorway, and reserve your time with him.

All Schooner members are also reminded that Matinee Drop-in Curling is going on every Friday afternoon from 1-3 unless otherwise stated online.

Open to all Schooner members, you can just show up on Friday and teams are made and games played from those in attendance. It's a great way to get a little more curling out of your Schooner membership.

Drawmaster's Musings

Hello Schooner Curlers:

We are now at the midway point of the curling season. Mixed is just starting the second half and Team Entry is about to begin their post-season playoff round.

I thought I would take this opportunity to discuss some of the more obscure rules that seem to get debated from time to time.

HOG LINE CONTACT

The first rule concerns the hog line and when rocks are deemed to be in play. A rock is considered in play only if it fully crosses the hog line, UNLESS it makes contact with another rock. If a rock makes contact with a guard and comes to a stop straddling the hog line, then it is deemed to be in play as it is assumed it would have crossed the line without contact.

SWEEPING OPPONENTS' ROCKS

I have seen both new and veteran curlers enthusiastically sweeping their opponent's rocks in the top half of the house. Eg. to move an opposing guard out of the way. This is not allowed. You may only sweep your opponent's rock once the front edge has crossed the T-line (one sweeper only). You may not sweep an opponent's stone anywhere above the T-line.

PRE-SWEEPING

Another common error is what I call pre-sweeping. I have seen many curlers "pre-heating" the ice when their opponent's stone is well above the T-line, or in the case of doubles, pre-heating when their own incoming rock is well above the hog. This is not allowed. The front edge must cross the line before you are permitted to sweep.

PLAYERS IN THE HOUSE

At the conclusion of an end and before the score is determined, only mates are supposed to be in the house. It is the mates' responsibility to agree to the score, or call for a measurement if needed. I have seen lots of people crowding into the house, tapping rocks with brooms, etc. This not only causes confusion, but sometimes rocks get bumped or moved prematurely. The rocks only get moved once the mates have decided on the results of the end, or have called for a measurement and asked for non-counting stones to be removed.

I realize that some of these finer points may seem picky, but the purpose of rules is to reduce potential arguments, and enable games to proceed smoothly and without hard feelings. After all, we all play the sport to socialize and have fun. Having everyone on the same page only helps. Thanks for listening, and see you on the ice! Richard

Spares

Recently there has been some confusion over who is allowed to fill in as a spare during league play at the club. To avoid further confusion we want everyone to know that, given our current policy, in order to spare in any league game you must be a member of the club in good standing. Like many club's in the province, the Schooner Club offers an opportunity to members of other clubs and some former Schooner members who are no longer part of our membership ranks the chance to spare or play one game per season out of courtesy as part of curling etiquette. This doesn't occur very often and only happens if there are no members available to take the spot. The Schooner Club, unlike some other curling clubs, does not offer a pay to play option. That is where a curler from outside of the club's membership can pay a pre-determined per game fee to spare in a league game. The number of times they can spare are usually limited to a few. The Schooner executive is going to look at implementing such a policy in the future. Members will have first opportunity to fill in for a missing player but, given the number of games we have with only three players on a team, having a player willing to pay for a game and fill an empty spot may be beneficial. Again, the number of times that any individual can do this will be

very limited. If anyone has any input on the topic you can email the club or bring your concerns or suggestions to any member of the Schooner executive.

Doubles Spiel

An in-house doubles spiel was held at the club last month on the first weekend back after the Holiday break, January 6 and 7. A total of sixteen curlers made up eight teams, each consisting of one male and one female curler, in the members-only event that used our usual hybrid 2 on 2 rules. Each team played three, six end games, one on Friday evening and two on Saturday with lunch being provided to all participants and guests on Saturday. Scoring was done using a points system with three points going to the winner of each game and two points for each end won. This structure can certainly change the strategy used in a game as each end is very important and valuable towards your final total. After a great two days of curling with lots of close games, the twosome of Cheryl MacKinnon and Keith MacEachern finished on top with a total of thirty three points, besting second place finishers Jenn Haigh and Adam Vassallo by two points after they finished with 31 total points. Haigh and Vassallo vaulted themselves into that second place position with a win over the father-daughter duo of Peter and Val MacIntyre in their final game. The Macintyre team had a chance at overtaking MacKinnon and MacEachern for first place but that loss dropped them into third place overall.

You can also choose to rent the Clubroom only for a flat rate of \$100 for an afternoon or an evening event. We will again provide bar service if required and you are free to supply your own food. We accept cash, debit, cheque (cleared prior to event) and e-transfer for rentals and cash and debit at the bar for drinks.

The Schooner club provides an intimate setting for birthday parties, wedding or baby showers, family get togethers or work outings for up to a maximum or 80 people. Children are welcome within times specified by Nova Scotia liquor licensing rules. If you require decorations, early access to the club can be granted on the day of the event or even up to a day prior to your event if our schedule allows.
