League Roundup

With the start of March we are beginning to see the finish line for league play that normally wraps up in mid-April. That means we have about six weeks left before the end of the season. Where did the time go? The Boston Pizza Team Entry League that plays on Sundays has been embroiled in a playoff round robin for a few weeks now. Teams are divided into two divisions and will play each team in their respective divisions and one crossover game with a team from the other division for a total of five games. Teams will then be seeded and play an elimination round until we get to a championship game and, finally, a playoff winner. The Russell Fitzgerald rink has continued their strong performance from the regular season in the playoffs, racking up three wins in the playoff round robin so far. Fitzgerald is in a division with regular schedule champs the Stephen Leslie rink, Robert Agnew, Peter MacIntyre and Carrie Cress. Both Agnew and Leslie have two wins thus far but Leslie has only played two games while Agnew has played all three scheduled. Division two is made up of Gordie Cormier, Gary Landry, Brian Laughlin, Mel Windsor and Jenna MacNeil. The surprise in this division so far has been the slow start of the Gordie Cormier rink. Cormier only has managed one win on three tries, dropping his most recent outing to the Mel Windsor foursome who scored a big end in the eighth to overcome a two point deficit to snatch the victory away from Cormier. The Cormier rink's struggles could be due to the absence of mate, Wally MacDonald, from many of their playoff outings so far due to work commitments. Gary Landry leads this division with two wins against one loss. Both Mel Windsor and Brian Laughlin sit tied with Cormier with one win. There's still a couple of weeks left in the round robin and a few teams have make up games before we will know how the next round plays out.

The East Side Mario's Mixed League is well into round two now. Teams were shuffled after round one and there has now been two divisions created, one for Monday night and one for Tuesday. Teams will play others on their respective nights twice each in this round. While there are two distinct divisions, teams points will be used to determine a single winner from all teams involved. There are still a number of weeks remaining in the schedule and there are a few make up games to be played due to weather cancellations so there is no one team making a bid as the favorite to win. The Schooner Doubles league continues play on Wednesdays with the schedule set to wrap up on April 19. With seven weeks remaining there are a number of people in the league still in the running for top spot and a winner will likely not be decided until the final week.

The Firestop Enterprises Men's League is heading into its final week of the regular schedule with two teams in the running for top spot. The Gordie Cormier rink leads the Russell Fitzgerald rink by only one point and the two are scheduled to play on the final night of the regular season. A win for Fitzgerald will vault him past Cormier into first place while Cormier only needs to muster a tie at the least to remain in the top spot. After the completion of the regular season the league will begin playoffs which will consist of a two division round robin and then an elimination round to determine a playoff champ.

So we still have lots of excitement in all leagues as we move towards the end of the season. Check back next month for more league updates. All members are reminded that Matinee Curling is also still underway every Friday afternoon from 1-3 pm. You can just drop in any Friday and play.

Drawmaster's Musings

With the beginning of March, we are now in the home stretch. Days are getting longer, and playoffs have begun in some leagues. I'd like to remind curlers that there is 1 sheet available on both Monday and Tuesday nights at 8 for makeup games, but please let me know if you are going to use the ice so we don't have too many teams showing up. Here are some more tweaks to think about going forward.

Delivering Rocks

According to the rules of curling, rocks must be delivered in a straight line from the hack to the broom. Additionally, right handed curlers must start from the left hack and vice versa. I have noticed some stick curlers starting from the wrong hack and/or walking out on a diagonal to get a better angle around a guard (which defeats the purpose of the guard). This is not permitted, as per Curling Canada's rule book. See below:

"The delivery of a stone by the right hand shall be initiated from the hack located to the left of the centre line. The delivery of a stone by the left hand shall be initiated from the hack located to the right of the centre line." AND

" The delivery and release of a curling stone are intended to occur in a reasonably straight line from the hack towards the target broom."

Burned Rocks

Recently, a few of us behind the glass had a discussion about burned rocks. It's somewhat technical, and even the wily veterans were confused about the rules.

Basically, there are 2 broad scenarios: 1) if a moving stone is touched before it reaches the hog line at the playing end, and 2) if a stone is burnt after it crosses the hog.

If before the hog line, the stone is stopped and removed immediately. Easypeasy, lemon squeezy.

If after the hog line, it is more complicated, so I'm just going to quote the rules directly:

"Inside the hog line at the playing end:

	 "Inside the hog line at the playing end: (a) If a moving stone is touched, or is caused to be touched, by the team to which it belongs, or by its equipment, all stones are allowed to come to rest, after which the touched stone must be removed from play and all stones that were displaced after the infraction are placed to their original positions; <i>unless the non-offending team considers it an advantage to;</i> (i) Leave all stones where they came to rest, or; (ii) Place all stones where it reasonably considers the stones would have come to rest had the moving stone not been touched. (b) If a moving stone is touched, or is caused to be touched, by the opposition or by their equipment, all stones are allowed to come to rest, after which the non-offending team places the stones where it reasonably considers the stones would have come to rest had the moving stone not been touched. (b) If a moving stone is touched, or is caused to be touched, by the opposition or by their equipment, all stones are allowed to come to rest, after which the non-offending team places the stones where it reasonably considers the stones would have come to rest had the moving stone not been touched." There are also scenarios re: a stone from another sheet and other external forces, but I'm not going to get into those now. If anyone is curious to read more, the full rules can be found at Curling.ca One final note re: spares - Players needing a spare should do more than simply post to the Facebook group and hope for the best. If you don't get an immediate response, please call the folks on the Spares List, and at least tell your skip you can't make it so it's not a surprise when folks show up at the Club.
Doubles Team Entry Cash Spiel	Richard The Schooner Curling Club will be hosting a Doubles (2 on 2) Cash Spiel on March 10 and 11 at the club. This is a team entry event with an entry fee of \$50 per team. Entries fees will be returned as cash prizes with a portion, \$10 per team, being donated to the Whitney Pier Boys and Girls Club in honor of former long-time Schooner member, Jackie Pearson. The club will also be contributing additional money to the donation. Sign up is now open at the club. If you do not have a partner for this event you can sign the sign he sheet as an individual but there are no guarantees of a spot or that you will form a team. Members are also encouraged to reach out on the private members Facebook group to try and find a team mate. This is always a popular event so don't please sign up quickly to avoid disappointment.
Team Cress forced to bow out of Provincial Club Championship	Skip Carrie Cress had hoped to take her team to Digby Nova Scotia to compete in the Ladies Provincial Club Championship event being held from March 2-5. The team, along with skip Carrie, consists of Jenna MacNeil, Julia Cormier and Jennifer Haigh. Skip Cress declared her intention to compete at the event as Schooner's representative and, even though no other team from our club challenged her for the club's spot, NS Curling Association rules were still preventing her and her team from competing.

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That was because Schooner didn't provide opportunity to meet any of the three criteria in our club that are required to pick a winning team. They appealed to our provincial curling association and, even though team Cress was granted the permission from NS Curling they needed to compete, due to logistics and work commitments of some of the players, they were forced to bow out. While this is a disappointing end to the story for team Cress for this season, we hope they will stay together for future seasons and eventually carry the Schooner flag to compete for the provincial club title. The winner of the Nova Scotia Provincial Championship event earns a spot in the Canadian Championship held during the following curling season. Best of luck to team Cress moving forward.

The premier event on the Schooner calendar for the season, the Schooner Cash Spiel, was held at the club from February 17-19. A total of ten teams took part in the event that saw rinks representing the Schooner, Sydney and the Strait Area curling clubs.

Play got underway on Friday evening with eight of the ten teams competing seeing action. Team Phillip Edwards and Team Robert Agnew had drawn byes and were automatically advanced to a second round game on Saturday. The 7PM draw saw Schooner representative Stephen Leslie defeat Sydney Curling Club's Wes Stanford rink while Sydney's Sebastian LeFort took down Schooner's Russell Fitzgerald in the other game. Leslie moved on to play Schooner's Phillip Edwards rink on Saturday morning while Lefort advanced directly to the "A" semi final on Saturday evening. Draw two of the night had two Schooner rinks, Gordie Cormier and Carrie Cress, face off on one sheet with Cormier coming out victorious, while the other match had the Travis Stone rink of Sydney playing Donald MacCuspic of the Strait and Area Community Curling Club, a game Stone would win. Cormier moved on to play another Schooner rival the following day, Robert Agnew, while Stone, like LeFort, advanced further in the "A", directly to the semi final. Losing rinks in round one would move to compete further in the "B" division.

On Friday evening all curlers and guests were treated to some snacks, finger foods, dips and desserts that were made and donated by various people. There was lots of delicious options to choose from. On Saturday, play got underway at 10am with the first action in the "B" division. Team Fitzgerald defeated team Stanford while the MacCuspic rink handed team Cress their second loss. Winners continued to play on in the "B" division while losing rinks went to "C" to play later in the day. The mid day draw at noon saw more action from the "A" side with Stephen Leslie taking on Team Edwards and Team Cormier facing the Robert Agnew squad. He was laid to rest at a very well attended funeral mass at Holy Redeemer Church on February ninth. Many in attendance were friends that Jackie had made in the Cape Breton Curling community over the years. Jackie was an instrumental part of resurrecting and revitalising the Schooner Club after the military had left the radar base. After curling at the club for many years, Jackie had stepped away from the sport for a while, only to return over the last couple of seasons to once again play at the Schooner.

Jackie was into many sports over the years, not just curling, playing hockey, soccer, golf and baseball. Jackie was proud to have been part of the first ever little league in Canada when the Sydney and District Little League was formed in 1951 and was inducted into the local sports hall of fame as part of the Indians team that won the title in that inaugural season. Jackie also gave back to the Whitney Pier community that he loved so much, volunteering countless hours for many organizations including being part of the creation of the Whitney Pier rink and later being on the board of directors helping to ensure its survival through hard times. He even got involved with civic politics for a while, holding the position of alderman for ward six back in the 90's. Jack was born and raised in the Pier, was proud to be a Pier boy and will spend his eternity overlooking the community he loved so much.

Club Rentals

Everyone is reminded that the Schooner Curling Club is available to rent for your next social event. You can rent the ice for a night of curling of you can just rent the clubhouse for your next party. Rental fees are \$50 per hour per sheet with a \$100 minimum for the ice. That means you can, at minimum, rent one sheet for two hours or two sheets for one hour. You are, of course welcome to rent the ice for longer periods if you wish. Ice rental includes required equipment such as brooms and sliders, the use of the Clubroom and, if required, we will provide bar services. You can bring your own food and snacks. You can also choose to rent the Clubroom only for a flat rate of \$100 for an afternoon or an evening event. We will again provide bar service if required and you are free to supply your own food. We accept cash, debit, cheque (cleared prior to event) and e-transfer for rentals and cash and debit at the bar for drinks.

The Schooner club provides an intimate setting for birthday parties, wedding or baby showers, family get togethers or work outings for up to a maximum or 80 people. Children are welcome within times specified by Nova Scotia liquor licensing rules. If you require decorations, early access to the club can be granted on the day of the event or even up to a day prior to your event if our schedule allows.
