## General Meeting

The fall General Meeting for the club was held on Wednesday, October 12 and was well attended with 30 returning and potential members in attendance. President Ray Cameron Called the meeting to order at around 7:00 pm with the first order of business being to go over the minutes of the spring general meeting held back on April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2011. There were a few items of business that had been tabled to the spring meeting that were discussed:

- Schooner Curling Club's Membership in the NS Curling Association – It was noted by President Ray Cameron that the Schooner Club has been paying large sums of money to be a member of the NS Curling Association without reaping any real benefits. It was questioned as to whether or not it would be worthwhile to continue this membership. The cost for the 2011-12 season would be roughly \$900-1000 depending on membership. Ray checked into the penalties of withdrawing our membership and the only issues are that we cannot host a provincial playdown, no member can compete in a provincial playdown and we will not have our events advertised on the Curl NS website. Given that these issues were minor to our membership, it was decided to save the money and not renew our club's membership in the NSCA. We can, in the future, rejoin with no penalty if so desired by the membership.
- The use of cellular phones during play. It was discussed that some members are annoyed that others are using cell phones and taking calls during play. Since some members are using these cell phones to get calls re. work, family or other important issues, it was decided that there would be no formal policy re. the use or ban of the phones but all members would be asked to exercise common courtesy and shut off the ringers and set all phones to vibrate only while playing and also to take only calls that were of an essential nature. Also, if you needed to take a call, leave the ice surface and keep it as short as possible so as not to hold up game play.
- Six end games versus eight end games on late draws. A discussion was had re. the nine pm draws and whether they should be six ends as opposed to eight ends as some members find that these draws end too late if they go a full eight ends. It was also noted that some members only play in one league a week and would not want a shortened game. It was brought up that one reason that the games are late in ending is that they are late getting going due to the early draw going overtime. It was decided that the games would remain at eight ends for all draws but steps would be looked at to help speed play along. Some ideas were to move the early draw start to 6:45 so that if the early draw went a little long there would still be time for ice prep and the late draw would get off on time. Also, skips will be asked to encourage players to speed game play and always be ready to throw and time limits for the early draw would be closely enforced and the bell would be rung to indicate to the teams they were short on time. Teams playing the late draw can still decide to limit their games to six ends but it was encouraged that all players should agree to the shortened game.

The next order of business was the committee reports starting with the treasurer's report given by Ray Cameron. Ray had passed out a revenue and expense summary of what had gone on since the end of last season and reported that everything was as expected and the club was in good financial shape. Next was Wayne Bonnell for Brian Laughlin with the Ice Directors report. Wayne said that things were going well with ice making but that the crew had been slowed down by the recent warm weather we have experienced. The slow down resulted in a delay with getting the ice finished and the opening spiel being moved from its original start date of October 17<sup>th</sup> to the 19<sup>th</sup> instead. Wayne also reported that, other than the weather, they had experienced no real problems and things were going well. Cal Thistle was next with the Draw Master's report and encouraged everyone to get applications in as quickly as possible to help him in making up teams and league schedules. Frances Ford of Housing requested that the club purchase a three-bin recycling center to help in sorting garbage to comply with CBRM waste management rules. Ray approved the purchase pending Frances supplying a final price to the club and that it's not too far in excess of the original \$75 estimate. The remainder of the committee reports were presented by those in attendance and the meeting was called to adjournment.
